Sail training facts and figures (last updated November 2014)

General

- The Tall Ships Races is Europe's largest, free family festival
- Sail Training International was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2007 for its work in promoting international understanding and friendship.
- Our 29 Members are the National Sail Training Organisations of:

Australia, Belgium, Bermuda, Canada, Croatia, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, India, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Russia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, United Kingdom, United States of America

In 2014

- Over 9,000 people enjoyed a sail training experience at an STI event in 2014
- Over four million visitors attended a Tall Ships Race or Regatta in 2014.
- Over 150 registered Tall and Small Ships took part in the Tall Ships Races and Regattas in 2014.
- Over 1,000 international broadcast, print and online media covered the Tall Ships Races and Regattas in 2014.
- Over 175,000 different news articles and stories and thousands of breath taking images which were wired and shared around the globe

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- If the media coverage generated in 2014 had been paid for advertising it would have cost over €22 million
- The Tall Ships Races and Regattas generated over 67,000 new Facebook fans

History

- The Tall Ships Races have been running since 1956.
- In 1964 the division of the fleet into classes A and B was introduced.
- In 1968 a 'Rule of Rating' was introduced to give an even chance to every competitor
- In 1972 the idea of a crew interchange was introduced to mix nationalities and different sized vessels. It was also the year Cutty Sark Whisky sponsored the Races.
- In 1973 the then USSR entering its first ships.
- In 1978 the American Sail Training Association (ASTA) affiliated itself to the then Sail
 Training Association, inspired by its ethos, and organised annual races in North and South
 American waters; plus a number of transatlantic races to join up with the European races.
 From there similar associations were born in Australia and New Zealand.
- In 1980 the use of VHF radios was introduced to the Races as a compulsory piece of
 equipment, for safety and keeping in contact with competitors. It also worked as an incentive
 to the trainees, as they were now aware of the position of their rivals and created a
 competitive environment between the vessels and crews.
- In 1992 a record was set for the Columbus Regatta when 32 Class A's and some 160 ships set off from Cadiz to San Juan in Puerto Rico
- In 2002 Sail Training International (STI) was founded as the organisers of The Tall Ships Races and Regattas we see today.
