Following the open and frank discussions we were able to have during our Conference in Gran Canaria in November last year, we are focused on implementing and developing the initiatives which came out of the feedback we received and we look forward to sharing the progress we are making with you over the coming months.

SAIL TRAINING NEWS...

SAIL TRAINING RESEARCH

During our recent conference in Las Palmas, one of the areas of focus was supporting research into the benefits of sail training for all stakeholders in the worldwide community.

In order to explore future support for research programmes, a Research Working Group was established in January. The remit of the Working Group is to explore how Sail Training International can support, disseminate and encourage research into Sail Training for the benefit of its members.

The Working Group, led by Murray Henstock of the board of trustees, has developed a number of recommendations to support ongoing research.

The first of these is the development of an online library of existing sail training research, which we are pleased to announce has already been launched and can be found under the Resources menu on the Sail Training International website.

The library includes over 30 articles, with a combination of free-to-access papers and a directory of articles that are held across a range of academic institutions.

The aim of the library is to provide a comprehensive point of reference for members of the sail training community to utilise as they carry out their own research, and support organisations looking to demonstrate the importance of sail training to youth development.



Alongside the online library, work is also underway to provide support for members in how they can assess and make use of existing research to support their aims and objectives. This will include guidance on different models to use when conducting research and providing templates for use when conducting and evaluating research.

In addition to these areas the group will also be looking at different avenues to provide funding for research projects, both through direct funding and the development of a communal funding model.

We are delighted to see the progress already made in this area and look forward to providing further updates in the coming months.

SAIL TRAINING INTERNATIONAL YOUTH COUNCIL

2022 was an exciting year for the Youth Council as they too moved away from online events and returned to in-person activities.

With representatives from over 20 countries, they delivered a number of projects and initiatives that brought young people from a truly international audience together to discover sail training for the first time, develop ongoing participation and promote best practice at sea.

In 2023, we're delighted to see them continue this important work with even more projects designed to further sail training around the world.

In addition to delivering these projects, the Youth Council have been taking a lead role in our review of The Tall Ships Races brand. With the aim of ensuring we continue to make our events an exciting option for young people, the review is currently underway and we look forward to announcing its outcomes in the coming months.

With the development of young people - regardless of nationality, religion, gender or social background - the central focus of everything we do, we are continually thankful for the crucial role the Youth Council play within the Sail Training family.





UPCOMING PROJECTS



After the success of their first International Voyage project in 2022 that brought 8 trainees together in European waters, the Youth Council have decided to repeat this voyage on a larger scale in 2023.

This voyage will see 16 trainees take part in voyage with a focus on providing real sail training experiences, encouraging continued involvement in sail training and promoting international friendship and understanding.



To further support inclusion across the world of sail training, the Youth Council have begun work developing an expanded information and certification scheme for ships.

Traditionally, ships share information related to the size, rigging and crew composition of their vessels, and this project will encourage the expansion of the information available to include dietary catering, LGBTQ+ inclusion and accessibility, ensuring the world of sail training is open to all backgrounds.




Continuing their successful work in 2022, the Youth Council's Promotional Materials group will continue to look at ways to improve the online presence of sail training for young people.

A working group led by Head of Youth Council Media and Communications, Eline Kristiansen, will be expanding their social media activities and delivering more online workshops and seminars throughout the year.

STATSRAAD LEHMKUHL WINS BOSTON TEAPOT TROPHY





Their winning voyage saw them sail 1,125 nautical miles with an average speed of 9.1 knots in January 2022, sailing through wintery gales and snowstorms during the passage. The award marks the 9th time Statsraad Lehmkuhl has won the trophy since its inception in 1964.

Everyone at Sail Training International would like to warmly congratulate Statsraad Lehmkuhl and her sailing crew for an amazing award winning voyage and on their ongoing excellent work delivering sail training experiences.

WHAT IS THE BOSTON TEAPOT TROPHY?

The Boston Teapot Trophy was created in 1964 when two Tall Ships were voyaging back from the US to Europe after the first transatlantic Tall Ships Races, to create competition for their young sail training crews on their journey. Since then, it has been contested annually ever since between some of the best sailed Tall Ships in the world.

To recognise the award, Brooke Bond Tea obtained permission from the Boston Fine Arts Museum to copy a silver teapot which was in use in Boston at the time of "The Tea Party".

This prestigious trophy has been awarded annually ever since to the vessel that sailed the greatest distance within 124 hours with a sail training crew aboard.

The extended time of the voyage helping to counteract any short-term effects of gusty winds and other factors that might provide short peaks of speed.

BURSARY & FUNDING NEWS

THE YOUTH DEVELOPMENT & CANADA LEGACY FUNDS LAUNCH APRIL 10

The Youth Development Fund

The Youth Development Fund is aimed at the development of more effective sail training programmes for young people from disadvantaged social backgrounds and provides £25,000 to support these.

Launched in 2019, it has helped over 20 organisations deliver some amazing sail training projects. The fund supports organisations that deliver sail training programmes reaching young people from diverse backgrounds, particularly those from a disadvantaged background and offers one or more of the following areas of development:

- Improve trainees' personal, social, or educational development
- Enhance international friendship and understanding
- Demonstrate replicable models of innovation and good practice in sail training

The Canada Legacy Fund

Following the success of the Rendez-Vous 2017 Tall Ships Regatta, the Canada Legacy Fund was set up with generous support from Rendez-Vous Naval de Quebec, providing \$25,000 (CAN) in funding each year.

The fund supports organisations from around the world that provide sail training programmes focused on helping disadvantaged young Canadians aged between 14-25 years. These programmes will offer one or more of the following:

- Improve trainees personal, social and/or educational development
- Enhance international friendship and understanding
- Demonstrate replicable models of innovation and good practice in sail training

LOOKING FOR SOME PROJECT INSPIRATION?

Here's just a few of the successful applicants' projects for the Youth Development Fund and Canada Legacy Fund in 2022...



Morvagh Sailing Project were awarded £5,000 for their ASPIRE 360 Round Britain Challenge, taking disadvantaged young people on a 1945 NM circumnavigation of the UK.



West Indies Sail Heritage Foundation were awarded £7,500 for their Go to Sea programme that helped young people improve their educational and employment opportunities.



OYT Scotland were awarded £4,000 for their Young Ambassadors Programme, a 10-day challenge voyage aimed at encouraging continued involvement in sail training for disadvantaged young people.



Ellen MacArthur Cancer Trust were awarded £3,500 for their First Time Trip Summer Programme that will provide sail training voyages to young people living through and beyond cancer.

OMAN BURSARY SCHEME OPENS FOR 2023

Oman Bursary Scheme 2023 is now open for applications for individuals, which can be submitted on the Sail Training International website.

The scheme is aimed at disadvantaged people aged between 15-25 years old – regardless of sailing experience, physical ability or nationality. It offers the chance for those who may not normally be able to embark on a sail training voyage, or take part in a Tall Ships event, to do so.

To help encourage people from all over the world to have the opportunity to sail, the bursary is limited to those who haven't taken part in a Race or Regatta before and each successful applicant will be awarded a maximum of £500.

We would like to once again extend our thanks to the Royal Navy of Oman whose generosity has made the Oman Bursary Fund and Youth Development Fund possible.

Having supported young people to have a Sail Training adventure through the Oman Bursary scheme since 2011, their continued support means we are able to bring the transformative experience of Sail Training to young people around the world.

ENDORSED EVENT: ARMADA ROUEN

L'Armada Rouen 2023 is a spectacular 10-day maritime festival held in Rouen, France. The event is one of the largest maritime festivals in the world and sees a majestic fleet of Tall Ships moor along the river Seine and welcome millions of visitors aboard during the celebrations.

In 2019, L'Armada Rouen celebrated its 30th anniversary and around 4 million spectators attended the event as it partnered with Sail Training International as the start port of The Liberty Tall Ships Regatta.

Visitors can expect plenty of entertainment as part of the celebrations, including some of the most beautiful vessels from around the world, live music, festivities and spectacular fireworks.
