FOREWORD

Another busy and successful year, with a six-port race series in the Baltic and the resumption of many activities that were put on hold during the pandemic.

You can find a brief report on the Races in this review, but I was particularly pleased to get to two of this year's ports, Tallin and Turku, who both did an outstanding job of hosting the ships and the young people.

Extending the series to six ports, with a longer deployment for the Race Team, undoubtedly puts increased pressure on the volunteers and staff involved, and I am very appreciative of the debt we owe all of them.

Once again we learned a lot from the Host Port Seminar, held in Turku this year, and expanded our Anchor Port Scheme, which gives greater certainty to ports and to our own forward planning.

Our primary focus is always on young people, and all of our other activities are an essential means to this end. You can find reports on our various bursary and project funding programmes, underpinned by generous support from The Royal Navy of Oman, Rendez-vous Naval de Quebec, and Marlow Navigation Netherlands.

Also in this review is a report from the Youth Council, an important part of our governance structure who keep us more directly in touch with our most important stakeholders.

Other activities are described in the following pages, but I want to finish by a special thanks to our Trustees and Directors, who give so much time, thought and effort to the oversight of such a complex international organisation.

We have some additions to these numbers, but I want to give my personal thanks to those stepping down this year, Raúl Mimbacas and Paul van Ommen. They both have long seafaring experience and an encyclopaedic knowledge of sail training and ship operation, which has been central to our thinking. We shall miss them.

This is my last year as Chair of Sail Training International. It has been a huge privilege to serve in that role, and to be part of the extraordinary worldwide family of sail trainers over a 35-year involvement.

My heartfelt thanks and good wishes to all of you.

THE TALL SHIPS RACES 2024



This summer saw us return to the Baltic Sea for the first time in 7 years with The Tall Ships Races 2024.

Across the races, we welcomed 67 ships from 16 different countries around the world to take part in over 870 nautical miles of sailing. Between them, the fleet brought the exciting experience of The Tall Ships Races to over 4,500 trainees and crew from across 36 nations.

On the water the Tall Ships took part in 3 races that saw them tackle a number of varied and challenging sailing conditions.

Once all was said and done, the ultimate prizes went to Lietuva (Lithuania), who came first overall on elapsed time, Fryderyk Chopin (Poland), who finished first overall in Class A, Rupel (Belgium), who finished first overall in Class B, Helena (Finland) who came first overall in Class C, and Tara (Denmark), who topped the table overall in Class D.

The main prize of the series, the coveted Friendship Trophy, was awarded to Fryderyk Chopin (Poland), who took the core theme of international friendship to their hearts throughout the series.

The trophy is awarded to the vessel — on the votes of all Captains — which has contributed the most to promote international friendship and understanding within the fleet throughout the whole of The Tall Ships Races.

TURKU JOINS ANCHOR PORT SCHEME

Ahead of the start of The Tall Ships Races 2024 Host Port stop in Turku, we were delighted to confirm that the Finnish city had successfully applied to join the Sail Training International Anchor Port Scheme.

Having first hosted the world-famous race series in 1996, Turku hosted The Tall Ships Races for the sixth time in 2024.

With the agreement to join the Anchor Port Scheme, they are now also confirmed to welcome the majestic Tall Ships fleet when they return to the Baltic Sea in 2028 and 2032, and every four years thereafter.

Joining three other Anchor Ports, Esbjerg, Aalborg and Antwerp, Turku becomes the first port in the Baltic Sea to achieve this status.

WHAT IS THE ANCHOR PORT SCHEME?

The Sail Training International Anchor Port Scheme is open to ports or cities who have a track record of delivering successful editions of The Tall Ships Races.

The scheme provides ports and cities the certainty of hosting a Tall Ships event at regular intervals.

It also enables Host Ports to be associated with our core values of youth development, international friendship and understanding, and protection of the environment.



THE TALL SHIPS RACES & REGATTAS HOST PORT SEMINAR TURKU



Alongside the announcement that Turku has joined the Sail Training International Anchor Port Scheme, the Finnish city also hosted the Tall Ships Races and Regattas Host Port Seminar.

The Seminar is one of the important events behind the scenes at The Tall Ships Races every year, and we were pleased to welcome 60 delegates from 22 Host Port organisations to the fourth stop of the series to take part in a series of sessions and workshops.

The programme this year continued our focus on the sharing of collective knowledge, and we would like to extend a special thanks to everyone who attended and took part to make the day such a success.

Once again the seminar proved to be an invaluable experience, highlighting different ways to help Host Ports deliver successful events and continue improving the experience for young people, ships, Host Ports and visitors.

BURSARIES AND FUNDING

Across the year, we were delighted to be able to deliver a number of bursaries and funds to support the delivery of sail training across the world. With the return of the Oman Bursary Scheme, the Youth Development Fund, the Canada Legacy Fund, and the launch of the Marlow Navigation Netherlands Bursary Fund we were able to provide over £65,000 in funding.

These funds and bursaries have helped provide young people from all backgrounds the chance to take part in a sail training adventure – particularly those who wouldn't otherwise be able to participate in this transformative experience.

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT FUND



The Cidran Sailing Trust were awarded £10,000 for their Voyages to Recovery Project, which supports young people living with psychosis and struggle to engage with conventional therapies.

World Ocean School were awarded £10,000 for their Tall Ship Immersive: Community Learning programme, a week long sail training voyage for 10 - 14 year olds.

CANADA LEGACY FUND



ISPA Japan were awarded \$10,000 for their ISPA Young Mariners Programme, which supported young people to develop leadership, cooperative and self-sufficiency skills on a 7-day voyage.



Nova Scotia Sea School received \$10,000 for their Youth Leadership Programme, which delivered 8 ocean based adventures in partnership with Immigrant Services of Nova Scotia.



Bytown Brigantine received \$15,000 for their Resilient Youth: Sailing into Leadership project, which aims to develop technical and leadership skills for 20 marginalised young people.

BURSARY FUNDING

MARLOW NAVIGATION NETHERLANDS BURSARY FUND

We are always grateful for the kind and generous support of different organisations around the world who recognise the transformative impact of sail training.

This year, we were delighted to be able to partner with Marlow Navigation Netherlands to offer the Marlow Navigation Netherlands Bursary Fund.

The £5000 fund offered young people aged between 15 and 25 years old the opportunity to take part in a voyage during The Tall Ships Races.

Thanks to the fund, 9 young people from 7 different countries were able to experience the magic of The Tall Ships Races.



OMAN BURSARY SCHEME RETURNS FOR 2024



The Oman Bursary Scheme returned for 2024 thanks to the kind support of the Royal Navy of Oman.

Now in its 14th year, the scheme has helped hundreds of young people since it was launched and we were delighted to support 24 applicants to take part in this summer's series.

The scheme is aimed at disadvantaged people aged between 15-25 years old — regardless of sailing experience, physical ability or nationality.

It offers the chance for those who may not normally be able to embark on a sail training voyage, or take part in a Tall Ships event, to do so.

SAIL TRAINING RESEARCH

The last year has seen some exciting developments in the world of sail training research with our research library continuing to grow and the launch of the Sail Training International Research Fund, a £10,000 fund aimed at furthering knowledge of the positive effects of sail training.

Alongside the ongoing work into producing and sharing research, our Research Working Group continues to explore the potential to collect a common data set across the fleet. The aims of this are to assist in a global analysis of sail training in the future as well as ways to build the resources available to support future research projects into sail training for the benefit of all Sail Training International members.

SAIL TRAINING INTERNATIONAL YOUTH COUNCIL

The Youth Council have continued their important work in 2024 as they continue to promote sail training around the world.

With representatives from over 20 countries, they delivered a number of projects and initiatives, designed to further sail training around the world, that have reached a truly international audience.

Of particular note, the Youth Council were able to provide some amazing experiences at sea through their expanded International Voyage project and newly launched Project Seafairer.

Between them, the projects saw 23 young people from 12 nations taking part in sail training experiences across Europe and the Atlantic Coast of North America.

With the development of young people the central focus of everything we do, we are continually thankful for the crucial role the Youth Council play within the sail training community.

YOUTH COUNCIL PROJECTS

PROJECT SEAFAIRER WELCOMES INDIGENOUS YOUTH ABOARD



Back in July, the Youth Council launched its inaugural SeaFair Project. A sail training programme for Indigenous youth, it was delivered in collaboration with organisations including Workforce Warriors and the Mi'kmaw Native Friendship Center.

Hosted by the Bluenose II crew, five Indigenous youth took part in a day-long sailing experience in Lunenburg, Canada. The voyage offered participants, typically underrepresented in the Tall Ships community, the chance to learn core skills such as navigation, knot-tying, and helming.

Following the voyage, a traditional smudging ceremony and a reflective debrief was held at the Lunenburg Yacht Club. Here participants had the chance to reflect on their experiences and discuss the ongoing opportunities for reconciliation between indigenous groups and the wider sailing communities.

INTERNATIONAL VOYAGE RETURNS IN 2024

After two successful voyages in 2022 and 2023, the International Voyage Project returned in October, sailing between Antwerp, Belgium, and Breskens, the Netherlands.

This year's voyage brought together 18 participants from 11 countries aboard two Belgian vessels, Rupel and Saeftinghe, with the aim of using the ships as platforms to foster cross-border friendships between the international participants.

Working alongside Blue Flag and Young Reporter Environmental groups, this year the voyage also offered participants the chance to engage in environmental initiatives whilst at sea.

Despite encountering some challenging weather conditions, the journey fostered a spirit of exploration and camaraderie, whilst also providing a rich environment to develop key skills and enhance environmental awareness.



NEW CREWMATES

The wide ranging services and activities that we deliver globally is only possible due to the efforts and expertise of our staff team.

This year we were delighted to see the team grow, with Rebecca Nelson joining as Commercial Assistant, and as well as expand their roles within the organisation, with Vanessa Mori becoming Deputy Chief Executive Officer.

Looking beyond our exciting calendar of events, plans are already underway for The Tall Ships Races 2027, which will see the races return to the Iberian Peninsula.


With a number of cities having submitted bids to host the event, we look forward to announcing the course in the coming months.




